



Social stigmas about fatherhood

Desired Supports: Custody

Stop the preferential treatment of mothers over fathers. If they're both good parents, make parenting equal.

Recognize my equal right to parent my own child.

Provide more basic custody rights to fathers without court intervention.



Desired Supports: Services for Fathers

It would be nice to see father support groups that allow dads a way to connect with each other and help each other grow as fathers.

Providing paid paternity leave that facilitates bonding with one's newborn child

Programs and outreach available to men as it would be with women



Desired Supports: Reduce Social Stigmas

Start with changing the stigma of dads only being responsible for providing financially for his family. Dads are more than that. They are positive male role models and excellent advisors. Dads are just like moms in a sense of having to wear different hats for the family. Dads have a lot to offer a child; they are not limited to just being a provider.

Help by accepting us as fathers.

Allowing fatherhood to be an admirable position in the family



Desired Supports: Child Support Issues

When we pay child support we should be opted into visitation regardless of a parenting plan.

Child support enforcement flatly refuses to collect child support for me. It would be helpful if they would end their unbalanced policies.

Allow for fathers to have the ability to earn enough money to live on while still paying child support.



Desired Supports: Financial Security

Subsiding child care, increasing access to child care, increasing amount of child care available in various regions

Lower taxes, invest in education, invest in child care


Better housing help, better help with food assistance






Relationship with Child's Mother

Fathers Participate from the Start


71% attended doctor's visits always or often during pregnancy



Of Unmarried Fathers Present At Birth (n=21)...

Only 52% reported that anyone at the hospital talked to them or gave them information about establishing paternity.
